

HELP STOP

Freshwater gold clam

The freshwater gold clam (Corbicula fluminea) is a small shellfish that reproduces rapidly. It can clog water pipes and may overrun native species. First found in the Waikato River in May 2023, it is an unwanted organism under the Biosecurity Act.

To stop gold clam from spreading to the Rotorua Te Arawa Lakes we need you and any visitors that you have coming this summer - particularly from the Waikato - to do their bit and follow the rules.



Got guests coming from the Waikato?

There are specific rules that apply to users of the Waikato River in the 'controlled area' which covers from the Whakamaru Dam to the river mouth at Port Waikato, including Lake Karapiro.

- No wake boats from the controlled area can be used on Bay of Plenty waterways or other waterways in New Zealand.
- All river users that have been in the controlled Waikato area must follow Check-Clean-Dry requirements for any craft, gear (such as fishing and other equipment used to gather kai) and equipment (including water skis, wakeboards, and inflatable pool toys).
- Any boat that has been in the controlled area in the last 30 days must be cleaned at the designated wash station.

Protect the Rotorua Te Arawa lakes you love

The Bay of Plenty Regional Pest Management Plan (RPMP) 2020 – 2030 requires that all boat ramp users must certify that their vessel (boat, jet ski) and trailer are free from freshwater pests.

- Complete a self-certification form before launching. The self-certification form must either be submitted electronically or displayed in the vehicle and left at the boat ramp where the boat was launched.
- Self-certification stations are at boat ramps, with paper forms available to fill out or QR codes to complete the process online.

Throughout summer Biosecurity staff will be checking the boat ramps regularly for compliance.

Lake Tarawera Pest Control

Not much Christmas cheer in the Pest Control World I'm sorry!

Rats

Rats remain the No 1 pest I deal with or get contacted about. My rodent tracking tunnels show there remain plenty of rats around and apart from the easily caught ones the others are wily and are not easily trapped or poisoned. Certainly of late there has been an increase in the number of rats, more than normal for this time of year. Mild winter = increased breeding. Rats will keep punching out the baby rats until they run out of food or get poisoned/trapped.

I have said it so many times. We wouldn't have such prolific birdlife if we were not baiting for rats.

Rabbits

Rabbits, I even have a rabbit on my lawn taunting me. There are really only two ways to deal with rabbits and they are shooting and poisoning. Shooting is mildly efficient on small numbers but people get a bit paranoid when a man and a rifle are outside the window plus the issue of being in a built up area makes shooting hard.

Poisoning needs a bit of equipment plus the cost of the bait, there is no easy fix for rabbits and same formula as rats Mild winter = increased breeding.

Possums:

I caught four possums last month all in Timms traps with apple and cinnamon bait, there are plenty more as I can hear them at night. Possums are much easier to catch than any of the other evil doers but they have the ability to melt into the undergrowth during the day which makes eliminating them a challenge.

Feral Cats

I haven't seen or heard of any lately but if needed we have a live capture trap.

Wasps

If you see a wasp nest please tell me and I will come and deal to it. We have the 100% formula to deal with them, no wasp nest has escaped the power of my 'Magic Wasp Killing Powder'.

Mustelids

I have a new PODI trap which is supposed to be the go for mustelids. I will trial it over the New Year period and see if I can up my dismal tally (One killed stoat.) I have seen a couple out in the reserve over from me so will apply myself to catching one. They are at the apex of being hard to catch and I have wasted too many hours trying so perhaps these new traps are a silver bullet.

I tried to hold the AGM this month but the date clashed so we will look at a date in February which might be easier for people to attend. We will let you know the date.

Lake Tarawera Security

Hello to all the community,

This past year has been a relatively quiet season. The combination of late night/early morning patrols, up till 3:00 am, and the new camera system, have to be credited to this. The license plate camera has been working wonders and I now have a collection of plates from suspicious vehicles which I have encountered. These are loaded onto the system and I am alerted as soon as they re-enter the community.

Throughout the season I have dealt with several suspicious cars/people at the various reserves at all hours of night. Most of these are from my own findings, but two came from calls of concerned residents. I am very happy to report there have no break-ins over the winter period. Wild weather has been the main factor contributing to the damage of property. This has kept me busy; from clearing fallen trees and flooding drains, to finding a boat that got free from a jetty and ended up at Red beach. A handful of medical calls ranging from minor to life threatening has also kept me on my toes. I have made sure my presence and purpose is known, particularly with all of the extra people and workers who are supporting the current projects happening around the community.

With the warmer weather finally starting to kick in there will be a vast increase in traffic and public using our roads and reserves so I will be around all through the holidays and the silly season doing my usual patrols.

This is a time for crime. Do not let you or your property become a target.

Some useful tips:

Buy a lock for your boat trailer – the type that go into the tow ball are cheap and very effective.

Let us know of your movements over this period and whether you would like me to keep and extra eye on your property. Tell your neighbours of your movements also.

If you see suspicious behaviour, take a description of the individuals/vehicle. You are not wasting our time, as too often small occurrences lead to bigger, more serious situations.

This is also the time for clearing the section and burning off green waste. If you have any questions or concerns about this, please feel free to get in touch. If you plan on burning on your property please notify myself or someone else at the Tarawera Fire brigade.

Message from Rotorua Mayor Tania Tapsell

Tēnā koutou, I hope you all have the opportunity to enjoy a well-deserved break over the summer.

Rotorua will be buzzing over summer with our stunning lakes and forests being a natural drawcard for holidaymakers, as well as a range of exciting events set to bring visitors to the district.

The quality of our lakes are precious to us, and freshwater gold clams pose a serious and irreversible biosecurity risk if they're spread. We are working collectively with the Ministry of Primary Industries, Te Arawa Lakes Trust, Bay of Plenty Regional Council, and our Rotorua Lakes Community Board on efforts to prevent visitors bringing freshwater gold clams to our lakes. We currently have information on our website pointing people to relevant information about gold clams and how to help prevent them spreading from the Waikato.

To also help protect Rotorua's lakes, recent engagement with the Tarawera community regarding interest in self installation of the sewerage scheme showed 75% of respondents wish to be included in the Council-led installation of Stage 2 of the scheme and do not support self-installation or want to explore this. On 12 December our Infrastructure and Environment Committee voted in support of progressing towards finalising a contract with the preferred tenderer for Stage 2 of the scheme. It was also noted that setting the final targeted rate for the scheme will be deliberated by Council during the 2025/26 financial year and our Council would like to consider more flexible, longer-term repayment options at this time.

In the New Year, we are very excited to be establishing our brand new Rotorua Youth Council. This is for young people between the ages of 15 and 20 who are interested in personal development, leadership and community, and want to have their voices heard in Council decision-making. If this sounds like someone you know, applications are open until 8 January! Visit the RLC website to apply.

Our Council has also been developing our 10 year Long-term Plan proposals over the past couple of months. We're focusing on delivering critical infrastructure and essential services well. Because high inflation and interest rates have increased costs, we've also had to cut back on non-urgent projects to ensure we can keep rates as affordable as possible. Before any final decision is made, we'll be seeking community feedback on this plan and we look forward to engaging with you about this early next year.

We're in a time of change, and I'm excited to share that our Council is appointing a new Chief Executive who will start early in the New Year. I've included our full Council in this process and I'm confident our new CE will provide valuable support as we continue to deliver better outcomes for our Rotorua community through 2024 and beyond.

We've had a productive and positive first year on the job and I'm happy with the progress our Council has made. Earlier this month I enjoyed connecting with our business community at the final

BA5 event for the year and it is heart-warming to see how business confidence is turning around and we are once again feeling optimistic about Rotorua's future.

Tarawera Landcare (2115): Pete Fahey

Its not easy writing a report on Landcare activities. Our main focus is and has always been eradicating pest plants and planting natives where they're needed. The main focus since 2015 has been Kariri Point. There's no further planting required as you will have noticed but there are always weeds, weeds and more weeds. Working bees on the point this year have been a bit sporadic due to some dodgy weather and the weeds currently need some work. The stretch between Rangiuru Bay Road and Boatshed Bay has had attention for the last couple of years and the native plantings have taken off. But guess what? The weeds need constant attention.

At the other end of the lake the Wednesday Weed Busting Group. headed up by Dave Townsend and Carol Gilchrist have done amazing work around Otumutu Lagoon. See Dave's comments below.

Wednesday Weed Busting Group

The group has been busting weeds since February 2022. We meet each Wednesday for about two hours. The general plan, which we discuss at regular intervals, is to attack weeds around the lakeside track from Bayview Road to Te Karamea Bay. There has been intensive work in certain areas (aided by the Landcare Group for some sessions.) There has also been a lot of planting done: by the stream near the fisherman's access and around the track in specific areas. We try to maintain the areas where weeds have been killed to manage regrowth, while also working on new areas. We have support from Richard Noke who provides expertise and resources. If you are interested in learning more, please ring Carol on 07 3628489.

Overall there is a very dedicated bunch of volunteers doing very rewarding work for the enjoyment of all, locals and visitors alike.

Looking ahead to 2024 we want to change tack slightly, not that the weeds no longer need busting, but there are other nasties hiding in plain sight threatening to take over if they're left unattended. I'm talking about old man's beard and those nasty flowering cherry trees. Sure the pigeons love the fruit but remember the pigeons were just fine before cherry trees arrived. There are numerous natives that can be planted that aren't the invasive pests that these guys are. The upside of getting rid of the cherries is that they make great firewood. As far as the old man's beard is concerned – it has nothing going for it.

So we will be making a plan early in 2024 to focus on these pests. If you're reading this and would like to get involved then we'd be pleased to see you.

Have a great Christmas and be sure to show your visitors Kariri Point and Otumutu Lagoon.



BOPRC Harbour Master Update Dec 2023

Kia ora koutou,

We've finally had some patches of fine weather and hopes are high for a much kinder summer than last year. The El Nino predictions usually see more wind from the westerly corner and when this occurs, we have noticed more coastal visitors coming inland to enjoy what are usually much better lake conditions. We are also expecting both Tarawera and Rotoiti will see more traffic due to displacement from the lakes that have high lake levels. *In short, we expect to be busy!*

The continuing high **lake levels** have had a significant impact on residents, infrastructure and boating safety. Rotorua Lakes Council and Bay of Plenty Regional Council are working together to ensure that everyone looking to travel to the lakes over the summer is aware of potential issues and risks in place. For the most up-to-date information visit the Rotorua Lakes Council website Lakes Levels page (you can click through from the home page) where the main issues and impacts are outlined by lake.

Patrol Teams – The past six weeks has been a busy time as our new skippers and crews undertake training for the summer season. Our patrol team are now operating full time seven days a week, so your community can expect to see us regularly on the water. Remember any "bad boatie" behaviour or navigational hazards or concerns you can call **0800 5KNOTS**. Our call centre will answer your call and we always have a Duty Harbour Master on call so we can usually direct patrols to these problem areas.

Again, this year a hard line will be taken on Lifejacket compliance, three people to ski, and vessels breaching the 5 knot rules. These rules are at the heart of keeping people safer on our lakes and infringements for these breaches are \$200.

Our "Boating in the Bay" booklet is a great way of getting yourself, friends and family educated with the Navigation Safety Bylaws. These rules are in place to keep our communities safer on the water. Boating in the Bay booklets are available online from our regional council website, get a hard copy from our office in Rotorua, or if you see our patrol teams, they will be happy to give you one.

New Maritime Vessel – It was a case of out with the old and in with the new at the start of December as we celebrated 23 years of service for *Ra* our 6.5m Ramco. Kingi Biddle (below) delivered a moving blessing for the new vessel, fittingly named *Rua* in a lakefront gathering.



Ra was a multiple purpose vessel responsible for moving other work teams around the lakes region, undertaking patrols and servicing almost 400 navigation buoys around our lakes. Rua our new vessel has been built with this versatility front of mind. A 6.7m Kingfisher Powercat, she offers more workspace, stability, and greater capability for carrying passengers and payloads. Its hoped Rua will be in operation by the end of January and a regular feature on Lake Rotoiti and Lake Tarawera.

Navigation Safety Bylaw Review Update - Every five years we review our bylaw to assess and improve its effectiveness in response to actual and potential safety issues as well as looking ahead to the future for any emerging risks. Formal submissions are open from 18 December 2023 - 29 February 2024 and you can find out more at Navigation Safety Bylaws | Participate BOPRC.

Tarawera Sewerage Scheme - Stage 2

Community Feedback and Actions

14 Dec 2023

Tēnā koutou,

Since our last update (7 December), the Infrastructure and Environment Committee met (12 December) and we'd like to share the outcomes and decisions from that meeting.

At the 6 September meeting, the Committee noted some community concerns before fully endorsing the scheme's Stage 2 implementation and paused finalising and awarding the openly tendered for contract until a community update was undertaken and further feedback was sought on key aspects of Stage 2. That community feedback has since been received and reported to the Committee – thank you for your response.

Elected members were updated on the results of the October 2023 feedback which, according to a rounded summary of general position, showed 75% of respondents wish to be included in the Council-led installation of Stage 2 of the scheme and do not support self-installation or want to explore this.

The Committee also received a Tarawera Sewerage Scheme petition requesting that Stage 2 of the Scheme is put on hold pending a final and fixed setting of the targeted rate for the whole scheme (Stage 1 and 2), being agreed with Tarawera property owners.

A letter from the Lake Tarawera Ratepayers Association was also received and tabled which noted their support of the Rotorua Lakes Council's led installation of the scheme (publicly owned) on property systems for Stage 2 of the reticulation scheme and their concerns that a delay to the implementation of the scheme would likely drive more costs when the community is seeking certainty. The Association's letter also sought Council support for equitable funding balance once the scheme nears practical completion.

Actions:

Committee agreed to give effect to its resolution (6 September 2023) to proceed towards a contract with the preferred Stage 2 tenderer.

Contractor mobilisation mid-2024, aligning with the operational need for Stage 1 to be completed before on-property systems are installed, tested, connected and commissioned.

Setting the final targeted rate for the scheme will be deliberated by Council at the appropriate time and at Council's Funding Policy discretion under their statutory authority.

Council will not strike an actual capital targeted rate at least until the year 2025/26 when the scheme is expected to be substantially completed with the capital targeted rate not starting until Scheme is complete.

Using the local transfer station correctly helps to lower the cost to maintain the facility, and maximise the amount of waste that can be recycled.



Disposing of household rubbish

Household rubbish goes into the red lid bins, in red plastic Council bags only.

To get more red bags, visit the transfer station during manned hours or call © 07 348 4199 for more options.

Household recycling

Recycling goes into the yellow lid bins. This includes paper and cardboard, aluminium and tin, and only plastic items numbered 1, 2 and 5 (due to limited onshore recycling facilities in NZ). Items that are commonly mistaken as recyclable are foil chip packets, polystyrene, tetrapak (long-life milk packaging), plastic

bags and gladwrap. Please put these in the household rubbish.





Glass recycling

Glass recycling is sorted by colour.

Please remember to remove bottle caps and jar lids before recycling your glass items.

Items for landfill

If you visit during manned hours (Thursday and Sunday, 1 - 4:30pm), you can dispose of green waste or rubbish for the Rotorua Landfill Refuse Transfer Station.

Fees changed in July 2021, after changes to the national waste disposal levy and Emission Trading Scheme by Central Government. You can find out more about this on Council's website.

Fish and Game Update: Matt Osborne

Tagged Trout Reporting

Fish & Game currently release 10,000 rainbow trout per annum into Lake Tarawera. This is undertaken within three liberations: Summer—1500 fish, Autumn—3000 fish and Spring—5500 fish. Autumn and Spring liberations are carried out over five months in total. Every fish that leaves the Ngongotaha Hatchery is marked (fin clipped) to identify them as hatchery-generated and additionally, within each of our seasonal releases, we liberate 500 tagged fish which assist us in monitoring growth rates of trout from year to year. If you should happen to catch a trout with a tag (which will be positioned near the dorsal on the left hand side), please let us know either through our tag return boxes at Stoney Point and Boat Shed Bay ramps, contact our office or use the QR code below. All returns go in the draw for a number of free season licences for the following season. The draw is conducted in June each year.



Boat Fishing Tuition for Beginners

On Saturday 6 January 2024 (10 am-12:30 pm) – We are again holding our ever popular "Boat Fishing How-To" for beginners at the Fish & Game Office/Hatchery at 1130 Paradise Valley Rd, Ngongotaha. We cover a range of methods and aim to help anglers catch more fish.

Summer Angling Update

Lake temperatures have been a little suppressed leading into the summer period given the stable weather we have had since opening. Tarawera is currently sitting at 18.55°C at the surface but should start to warm rapidly if we get nice hot days through the Christmas period. Presently trout are to be found throughout the water column from surface to 30m, targetable by all methods. The condition of the younger fish (<2.5yrs) is very good and will provide a thrill on the line and fine flesh for smoking. Keep an eye out for smelting trout on the surface and sign at depth on your fish finders. Don't be afraid to change things up if you are having difficulty catching and ask others how they're doing and what they are using.

Remember to CCD (Check, Clean, Dry) to protect our lakes.

Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from all at the Fish & Game team. Remember to carry your fishing licences with you and we hope to see you on the water, catch up with how you've done and provide some fishing tips.


